New Cardiac Care Campaign Gets Major Boost from Municipal Hail Insurance

Cardiac care in Regina will reach greater heights, thanks to a new partnership between Hospitals of Regina Foundation and Municipal Hail Insurance. Municipal Hail Insurance has pledged to match donations from the community up to \$1 million, in support of the Foundation's new \$2.5 million Cardiac Care Campaign to upgrade technology in the second Catheterization (Cath) Lab at Regina's General Hospital. This exceptional commitment means every donor dollar will have double the impact.

The new campaign was launched on April 16th, at the Regina General Hospital, with a number of dignitaries in attendance, including the Minister of Health, Everett Hindley and Regina's Mayor, Sandra Masters.

"Approximately 70% of patients at the Catheterization Lab come from outside Regina. A 2019 US study tracked the cause of death for farm workers between 1994 and 2019, concluding that 70% of farmer deaths were related to heart disease. This connection to our agricultural sector made Municipal Hail Insurance's support of the Cardiac Care Campaign a natural fit", said Rodney Schoettler, CEO of Municipal Hail Insurance.

Interventional cardiologists, working in our two Cath Labs, diagnose and treat coronary artery disease: critical heart

problems related to the blockage of blood vessels to the heart, helping thousands of people in our community. Created in 2006 as part of a \$6.2 million investment by the Foundation in the Mosaic Heart Centre, the first Cath Lab was upgraded in 2020. The Foundation will upgrade the second Cath Lab through our new Cardiac Care Campaign.


Last year, more than 2,400 procedures were completed in the Cath Labs at Regina's General Hospital, with more than 70% of those patients living in rural areas outside of Regina. With a growing need for procedures such as a transcatheter aortic valve implantation (TAVI), a procedure that allows for a new heart valve to be implanted using a catheter, the upgraded technology will help our medical teams provide patients with the best cardiac care possible.

"This campaign will help us to significantly improve the level of cardiac care in southern Saskatchewan, thanks to the leadership and generosity of Municipal Hail and the support of our community", said Dino Sophocleous, president and CEO, Hospitals of Regina Foundation.



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Mosaic Heart Centre Gives Regina Man New Lease on Life

"One word? Amazing!"

Craig Romanyk didn't know much about our Mosaic Heart Centre, in Regina's General Hospital, prior to February of this year. That changed when doctors discovered he had a blocked artery, which would have led to a major heart attack if left untreated much longer.

"I'd been experiencing symptoms offand-on for probably a couple of years", says the retired Regina sales executive. "Finally, it got to the point where I'd be out of breath just taking the dog for a walk. My cardiologist ordered a stress test, which I subsequently failed miserably!" That failed test in early February 2024 led to a visit to the Cardiac Catheterization (Cath) Lab at the Mosaic Heart Centre, where an angiogram revealed the full extent of the blockage. A decision to insert a stent to enable full blood flow to and from Craig's heart was made and the procedure was performed in the Cath Lab on February 28, 2024. Craig was able to go home to start his recovery the next day.

"Amazing! From the time I got to the hospital, I was blown away by the caring and professionalism of the staff", Craig explains. "And thank goodness for the state-of-the-art technology that Hospitals of Regina Foundation donors help supply. Can you imagine? Having a heart procedure and going home the next day? One word: amazing!"

Heart disease and stroke account for almost 20 per cent of all deaths in Canada. Each year, thousands of people receive cardiac care in Regina. As one of only two cardiac centres, patients come from across the province to receive specialized care in our cardiac centre of excellence. Last year, doctors in the two Regina Cath Labs performed more than 2,400 procedures.

Investing in the best possible cardiac care is a priority for the Foundation. In 2020, the Foundation funded a technology update in one of our two Cath Labs.

"Now, the second Cath Lab needs to be updated", says Lisa Green, senior

vice-president, Hospitals of Regina Foundation. "We are determined to deliver the best technology available to our Regina cardiac teams. That's why the Foundation has announced a new, \$2.5 million Cardiac Care Campaign to upgrade our second Cath Lab to meet the growing cardiac care needs of Saskatchewan and improve the heart health of our community."

A Ripple Effect of Kindness and Love

Sometimes a seemingly small action can create a ripple effect, turning into a tidal wave of persistent impact beyond that initial moment. An amazing example of this are the efforts of Hospitals of Regina Foundation's Community Member and Pediatric Ambassador, 15-year-old Catherine Okolita.

At five years of age, Catherine and her mom made a trip to the park, like they had done many times before. This time they realized the park had become increasingly littered, and Catherine's mom decided they would not be going back until someone cleaned it up. This is when five-year-old Catherine thought to herself, "I'm someone! I can clean that park up for everyone." After recruiting a few willing friends and cleaning the park of litter, Catherine recognized the impact she could have on our community and created Catherine's Cause to promote her charitable work.

"I realized that the "someone" who could make a difference could be me, so I made up my mind to help and give back", Catherine explains. "It was around this same time that I heard the Z99 Radiothon in support of the Regina NICU on the radio, and I told my parents I too wanted to help those babies however I could."

Starting in 2013 and for the first three years of her fundraising efforts, Catherine made keychains which she sold for \$10 each, with all profits going towards our Neonatal Intensive Care Unit in the Rawlco Centre for Mother Baby Care, at the Regina General Hospital. In 2017, Catherine took her efforts a step further and launched the Catherine's Cause Facebook auction, which recently concluded its seventh on-line auction in 2024.

"I was absolutely amazed by the support from my friends, family, and the community when we started *Catherine's Cause*", Catherine explains. "I think it's important to spread kindness and in turn make the world a better place. Helping each other and giving back encourages people to be their best selves. Even a small donation, or giving a small amount of personal time, adds up to create that ripple effect of kindness and love."

Over the last nine years of *Catherine's Cause* supporting Hospitals of Regina Foundation and the Z99 Radiothon, Catherine has raised more than \$342,000 for our Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Thanks to this incredible contribution, countless babies have received the life-saving care they needed, right here at home.

Mother and Baby are Doing Fine, Thanks to Regina's Hospitals

Sharla Rich's fourth pregnancy was a fairly routine one, although the Weyburn mom of three had felt sicker than with any of her previous pregnancies. However, on August 13, 2023, things took a dramatic turn. Luckily for Sharla and her unborn daughter, world-class help was a short drive away, in the form of the medical teams at Regina's General Hospital.

"I woke up at 3 a.m. that Sunday morning and I was bleeding. My urine was full of blood. I remember being rushed to the hospital in Weyburn. Next thing I knew, I woke up at Regina's General Hospital two days later. My baby, Xola, had been delivered via C-section while I was out and was being looked after in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) at the Rawlco Centre for Mother Baby Care. That was the start of our adventure", shares Sharla.

Sharla had developed a rare condition called placenta percreta, where the placenta had slipped out of the uterus and adhered to the wall of her bladder. It is a rare but potentially life-threatening complication. In Sharla's case, it required four surgeries, 17 blood transfusions and some time spent in a medically-induced coma.

The condition is so rare, doctors in Regina had to consult with their counterparts in Toronto for guidance. Sharla needed care from our medical teams at the Regina General Hospital for five weeks to recover. Eventually, on September 16th Sharla was given the all clear, to the relief of her family. Then it was just a matter of healing and recovering, while waiting for Xola to be strong enough to join her older brother and sisters at home.

While her Mom was receiving life-saving care, baby Xola was under the watchful eyes of the team in our NICU. She was born at 27 weeks, weighing only 2.3 pounds.

"I will never be able to say enough good things about the medical teams at RGH", Sharla says. "While I was recovering, they took such fantastic care of Xola. They treated her like she was a member of their own families. I don't know if either of us would be here today without them."

Fortunately, Xola was fairly healthy but, being born early, her lungs were not fully developed and she needed time on a C-PAP machine in order to help her lungs grow strong enough to breathe on their own. On December 8, after 117 days in the NICU and the pediatric special care nursery, Xola was discharged.

"This was the best Christmas our family had in years", Sharla confides. "The medical teams gave us the ultimate present – our family was healthy and together for Christmas.
